1st Reading – Bishop George Murry, Diocese of Youngstown

Racism is a sin that divides the human family and violates the fundamental human dignity of those called to be children of the same Father, and the church must become a consistent voice to eradicate it. In his letter to Ephesians, St. Paul tells us Jesus is our peace. It is by means of his shed blood and broken body that the dividing walls of enmity have been demolished. Today the Catholic Church in America must recognize that Christ wishes to break down the walls created by the evils of racism, whether that evil is displayed publicly for all to see or buried deep in the recesses of our hearts. If not, we are destined for history to continue to repeat itself, and once again the church will be perceived as a silent observer in the face of racism. In imitation of Christ, we the church must be willing to give our total lives over to the liberation of women and men by defending the dignity and fundamental rights of every human person and this includes a visible denouncement of racism. Through listening, prayer and meaningful collaboration, I am hopeful that we can find those lasting solutions that we so much need, and to find common ground, where racism will no longer find a place in our hearts or in our society.
